Vehicles "Taken Without Permission"

LEADS Administration frequently receives the question: "Can a vehicle taken without permission be entered into LEADS?"

The phrase "taken without permission" is normally used to convey that some type of relationship exists between the owner and the person who took the car (i.e., father/son, boyfriend/girlfriend, etc.) and that the owner does not want a theft report filed, but only wants the return of his property.

If no theft report taken, then the vehicle may not be entered.

Do not use the phrase: "taken without permission" it's either stolen, or it's not.
