2. Explain the national standards, protocols and/or operating measures that will be followed.

The Cook County 9-1-1 Center has its own Standard Operating Procedures and follows PowerPhone's Total Response Call Handling Protocol System. The IP phone network is protected by a SonicWall NSA 2700 firewall. In addition to the firewall, the network is monitored by a DarkTrace AI Cybersecurity appliance. The appliance reports security concerns to the Cook County Sheriff's Information Security Office, which is monitored 24x7x365. Computers do not have DNS and internet access is limited by the firewall to the Dark Trace appliance and CrowdStrike Falcon Software.

3. Explain what measures have been taken to create a robust, dependable, and diverse/redundant network and whether other 9-1-1 Authorities will be sharing the equipment.

There are no changes necessary to the existing 9-1-1 system at the Cook County ETSB. AT&T has determined that Cook County ETSB can add the Olympia Fields call load to is existing network. The MAX-CT system was installed in 2015. In 2022, both core servers in Des Plaines and Maywood were upgraded to high-capacity servers to handle the increase in activity since the Cook County ETSB has expanded operations so rapidly.

4. Explain what security measures will be placed on the PSAP's IP 9-1-1 network and equipment to safeguard it from malicious attacks or threats to the system operation and what level of confidentiality will be placed on the system in order to keep unauthorized individuals from accessing it.

Cook County ETSB has a redundant primary center in Maywood that operates 24/7. Overflow calls are routed to NWCDS in the event that additional staff is commuting from Des Plaines to Maywood. The network route from Des Plaines to Maywood is through a closed circuit OPT-E-Man circuit and backed up through a microwave connection. Each location can work independently on its own phone controller.

GIS data is submitted to the AT&T ESINet via web-based Spatial Interface (SI) portal. The portal provides secure GIS file transfer. 9-1-1 authorities can maintain their local database schema and configure database changes using attribute field mapping tools. The SI validation engine logs errors and refers errors back to the originating 9-1-1 authority in comprehensive reports that are retrieved in the 9-1-1 Enterprise Geospatial Database Management System (9-1-1EGDMS). Validation errors are corrected by the 9-1-1 authority within their own GIS database. Updates are submitted and processed on an on-going basis.

Network costs of 23,000 are ESINet costs Paid by ISP. We don't anticipate incurring any additional costs with the addition of Olympia Fields.

Implementation costs include quoted costs for equipment to on-board Olympia Fields. They have 8 vehicles needing 8 modems, 3 MDTs, and 3 docks. The cost for 3 MDTs and 3 docks together is \$4,788 each. The cost for 8 modems is \$2,930 each. Installation costs will be approximately \$650 each.

Annual operating costs include \$4,500 for phone maintenance and \$1,700 for four Motorola P1 CAD licenses.

With the addition of Olympia Fields, a full year of surcharge revenue for all our agencies is expected to be approximately \$7,432,843.

 The Test Plan defines testing with all OSPs and Aggregators who are known, including but not limited to, call testing, system overflow, system backup, pre-determined alternate routing, call transfers, NG9-1-1 address components and functionality, Integrated Text to 9-1-1 for Short Message Service (SMS) or Real Time Text (RTT) and if applicable, Multimedia Messaging Service (MMS), measurement tools, reporting solutions and voice and speech quality. They also participate in testing voice 9-1-1 calls and text-to-911 from all the wireless carriers. Discrepancy Reports are submitted for any misrouted call(s) or text(s).

RESOLUTION TO ACCEPT THE VILLAGE OF OLYMPIA FIELDS INTO THE COOK COUNTY 9-1-1 SYSTEM

WHEREAS, the State of Illinois has enacted the Emergency Telephone System Act, 50 ILCS 750/0.01 et seq. ("Act") which enables a county to impose a surcharge on billed subscribers of network connections provided by telecommunications carriers at a rate per network connection in order to implement and maintain a 911 Emergency Telephone System; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Section 26-79 of Ordinance Number 01-O-35 of the Cook County Code of Ordinances ("Ordinance"), the Cook County Emergency Telephone System Board ("ETSB") has the authority to plan and implement a 9-1-1 system and receive monies from the surcharge imposed under the Ordinance; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to 50 ILCS 15.4(a)(2), the Village of Olympia Fields has requested that it be included in the Cook County 9-1-1 System and has agreed to the payment of the surcharge for such 9-1-1 services as established by the State of Illinois; and

WHEREAS, the ETSB has agreed to accept the Village of Olympia Fields into the Cook County 9-1-1 System subject to approval by the Illinois State Police.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that pursuant to a request by the Village of Olympia Fields, the ETSB hereby approves the inclusion of the Village of Olympia Fields within the Cook County 9-1-1 System to commence upon the approval of the Statewide 9-1-1 Administrator of the Illinois State Police. Upon such approval, all telecommunications carriers shall be notified to impose the applicable surcharge rate for such 9-1-1 services as established by the State of Illinois upon all customers located within the Village of Olympia Fields.

INTERGOVERNMENTAL AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE COUNTY OF COOK, ON BEHALF OF THE COOK COUNTY SHERIFF AND VILLAGE OF OLYMPIA FIELDS

This Intergovernmental Agreement ("IGA") is entered into by and between the County of Cook ("County") on behalf of the Cook County Sheriff's Office ("CCSO") and the Village of Olympia Fields ("Olympia Fields"), (collectively, the "Parties"), pursuant to authority granted by the Illinois Constitution of 1970, Article VII, Section 10, and The Intergovernmental Cooperation Act, 5 ILCS 220/1 et seq.

I. RECITALS

WHEREAS, the Cook County Emergency Telephone Systems Board ("Cook ETSB") operates the Cook County 9-1-1 system ("9-1-1 System") in the unincorporated areas of Cook County and in certain municipalities; and

WHEREAS, the CCSO processes 9-1-1 calls and provides other services for the 9-1-1 System, including call taking, dispatching, and radio monitoring; and

WHEREAS, the budget for the CCSO, through the Annual Appropriation Bill adopted by the County Board, currently funds the salary and benefits for in excess of one hundred and twenty (120) employees who currently staff the 9-1-1 System's communication center; and

WHEREAS, the Village of Olympia Fields Police Department ("Olympia Fields PD") have conducted their dispatch activity on the SouthCom Combined Dispatch Center, but are choosing to consolidate Dispatch Services with another emergency telephone systems board; and

WHEREAS, Olympia Fields desires to obtain the CCSO's 9-1-1 System dispatching services for Olympia Fields PD and agrees to reimburse the CCSO for providing said services pursuant to this IGA; and

WHEREAS, the CCSO agrees to provide 9-1-1 System call answering, dispatching, and call transferring services (collectively, "Dispatch Services") services to Olympia Fields PD twenty-four (24) hours a day, seven (7) days a week; and

WHEREAS, the County, the CCSO and Olympia Fields seek to enter into this IGA where the CCSO will provide Dispatch Services to Olympia Fields PD.

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual covenants and agreements set forth herein, the Parties agree as follows:

II. INCORPORATION OF RECITALS

The recitals set forth above are incorporated herein as though fully set forth.

III. GENERAL PROVISIONS

A. Term: The term of this IGA shall begin on upon full execution by all Parties ("Effective Date") and shall continue for five (5) years from the Effective Date ("Termination Date").

B. Termination: Either the CCSO or Olympia Fields may terminate this IGA for any reason or no reason at all at any time after the first three (3) months of the Term upon one hundred eighty (180) days written notice.

C. Roles and Responsibilities:

- The CCSO agrees to provide 9-1-1 System dispatching services to Olympia Fields PD twentyfour (24) hours a day, seven (7) days a week. Olympia Fields PD dispatch will be done on a Cook County 800 mhz frequency. The Dispatch Services will be provided to Olympia Fields in accordance with the County's Standard Operating Procedures ("SOPs") for operation of the 9-1-1 System. The CCSO will make copies of the most current SOPs in place available to Olympia Fields for review promptly upon request. The CCSO will also notify Olympia Fields of any changes to the SOPs that will materially affect the level of service provided to Olympia Fields under this Agreement.
- 2) All calls for Fire/EMS response by Olympia Fields will be transferred to Orland Fire Protection Dispatch is accordance with the County's current agreement and SOPs for call transferring with Orland Fire Protection District. At the time the Village of Matteson takes over responsibility for Olympia Fields' fire/EMS response services, CCSO will transfer all calls for fire/EMS response to Matteson.
- 3) Olympia Fields will adhere to all CCSO-provided current 9-1-1 Center procedures covering radio use and officer safety practices mandated by the CCSO.

D. Operational Reimbursement

 Olympia Fields agrees to reimburse the CCSO on a monthly basis, with the first invoice being sent prior to commencement of services, for all personnel and operational costs associated with this IGA, including but not limited to costs associated with any additional positions necessary for performance of services ("CCSO Reimbursement"). Reimbursements shall take place in accordance with the following schedule, with any partial year prorated based the number of days the IGA has been in effect for that year:

> 1^{st} year of service - \$88,732.00 2^{nd} year of service - \$92,050.00 3^{rd} year of service - \$96,916.00 4^{th} year of service - \$102,002.00 5^{th} year of service - \$107,431.00

2) CCSO will send Olympia Fields a monthly invoice. Payment to the CCSO will be due within thirty (30) days of receipt of invoice. The provisions of the Local Government Prompt Payment Act (50 ILCS 505/1, et seq.) will apply to all payments due under this IGA.

IV. INDEMNIFICATION

- A. Olympia Fields agrees to indemnify, defend, save and hold the County and the CCSO, and their respective Commissioners, agents, officers, and employees harmless from and against any and all liabilities, claims, demands or suits brought by any employee of Olympia Fields pursuant to this IGA or member of the public arising out of any negligent act or omission of Olympia Fields and/or its agents, officers, or employees in the performance of this IGA.
- B. The County shall be responsible for the acts of its agents, officers, or employees in the performance of this IGA.

V. DISPUTE RESOLUTION

In the event of a dispute between Olympia Fields and the CCSO concerning this IGA, each shall designate a representative who shall meet to resolve the dispute. If the designated representatives fail to resolve the dispute, then the CCSO's General Counsel and Olympia Fields's General Counsel are responsible for reasonably resolving the dispute in good faith and in a cooperative manner.

VI. NOTICE

Unless otherwise specified, any notice, demand or request required hereunder shall be given in writing at the addresses set forth below, by any of the following means: (a) personal service during regular business hours; (b) facsimile transmission during regular business hours; (c) overnight courier; or (d) first class mail properly addressed with postage prepaid and deposited in the U. S. Mail. Any notice, demand or request served personally or by facsimile transmission as aforesaid shall be effective upon receipt. Any notice, demand or request served by overnight courier shall be deemed received on the business day immediately following deposit with the overnight courier. Any notice, demand or request served by U.S. mail shall be deemed received two (2) business days following deposit in the mail. Notices shall be served at the following addresses or at such other place as the Parties may from time to time designate in writing by notice given hereunder

VII. MISCELLANEOUS

- A. <u>Compliance with Laws</u>. The Parties shall at all times observe and comply with all applicable federal, state and local laws, statutes, ordinances, rules, regulations, codes and executive orders, now existing or hereinafter in effect, which may in any manner affect the performance of this IGA.
- **B.** <u>Counterparts</u>. This IGA may be executed in any number of counterparts, each of which shall be deemed an original and all of which, taken together, shall constitute a single, integrated instrument.
- C. <u>Governing Law and Venue</u>. This IGA shall be governed by and construed in accordance with the laws of the State of Illinois, without regard to the principles of conflicts of law thereof. If there is a lawsuit under this IGA, each Party hereto agrees to the original jurisdiction of those courts located within the County of Cook, State of Illinois, with regard to any controversy arising out of, relating to, or in any way concerning the execution or performance of this IGA.
- D. Entire Agreement: Modification. This IGA constitutes the entire agreement between the Parties with respect to the subject matter hereof and supersedes any prior agreements, negotiations and discussions. This IGA may not be modified or amended in any manner without the prior written consent of the Parties hereto. No term of this IGA may be waived or discharged orally or by any course of dealing, but only by an instrument in writing signed by the Party benefited by such term.

- E. <u>Severability</u>. If any term of this IGA or any application thereof is held invalid or unenforceable, the remainder of this IGA shall be construed as if such invalid part were never included herein and this Agreement shall be and remain valid and enforceable to the fullest extent permitted by law.
- F. <u>Conflicts</u>. This IGA shall not be legally binding if entered into in violation of the provisions of the Public Officer Prohibited Activities Act, 50 ILCS 105/0.01 et seq.
- G. <u>No Third Party Beneficiaries</u>. No claim as a third-party beneficiary under this IGA by any person shall be made, or be valid, against CCSO or Olympia Fields.
- H. <u>Status of Employees</u>. The CCSO employees providing services under this IGA shall remain employees of CCSO and nothing herein shall be deemed to create any employer-employee relationship between Olympia Fields and such employees.
- I. <u>Non-Waiver</u>. No party shall be under any obligation to exercise any of the rights granted to it in this Agreement. The failure of any party to exercise at any time any right granted to such party shall not be deemed or construed to be a waiver of that right, nor shall the failure void or affect the party's right to enforce that right or any other right.
- J. <u>Rights Cumulative</u>. Unless expressly provided to the contrary in this Agreement, each and every one of the rights, remedies, and benefits provided by this Agreement shall be cumulative and shall not be exclusive of any other rights, remedies, and benefits allowed by law.

AGREEMENT RELATING TO TRANSFER AND REPORTING OF SURCHARGE FUNDS ATTRIBUTABLE TO THE VILLAGE OF OLYMPIA FIELDS, ILLINOIS

THIS AGREEMENT (the "Agreement") is made and entered into the $\leq \mathcal{M}$ day of System Board ("Cook County ETSB") and the Southcom Emergency Telephone System Board for the purpose of providing for the transfer of and reporting relating to certain surcharge funds attributable to the Village of Olympia Fields, Illinois ("Village") (the Cook County ETSB and the Southcom ETSB are sometimes referred to herein individually as a "Party" and collectively the "Parties").

WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, Section 15.4a of the Emergency Telephone System Act, 50 ILCS 750/1 *et seq.* (the "Act"), requires any 9-1-1 Authority, as defined by the Act, in a county with a population of at least 250,000 to consolidate such that no 9-1-1 Authority in the county serves a population of less than 25,000; and

WHEREAS, Cook County ETSB operates the Cook County 9-1-1 system in unincorporated areas of Cook County and certain municipalities; and

WHEREAS, in accordance with the Act, Southcom ETSB, is a Joint ETSB, and the Village of Olympia Fields (the "Village"), along with other municipalities, participates as a member municipality; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to 50 ILCS 15.4(a)(2), the Village requested that it be included in the County 9-1-1 System, and the Cook County ETSB has agreed to accept the Village into the Cook County 9-1-1 System; and

WHEREAS, in accordance with the bylaws adopted by Southcom ETSB, the Village has provided notice of its termination as a member of Southcom ETSB and its intention to join Cook County ETSB; and

WHEREAS, to facilitate the Village's transition from Southcom ETSB to Cook County ETSB, the Parties desire to enter into this Agreement to confirm their understanding that Village will cease to be a member of Southcom ETSB and will become a member of Cook County ETSB; that, thereafter the boundaries for wireless emergency calls of each Party will change such that wireless emergency calls originating in the Village will be handled by Cook County ETSB; and, to provide for the transfer to Cook County ETSB of any funds held by Southcom ETSB attributable to Village, after the effective date of the Village becoming a member of Cook County ETSB, including any surcharge funds (such as those funds commonly known as wireline and hold harmless surcharge funds) collected after the effective date of the Village becoming a member of Cook County ETSB, pursuant to the Act or any other applicable statute or ordinance (the "Funds");

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the promises and mutual covenants hereafter set forth, the Parties agree as follows:

Section 1. Incorporation of Recitals.

The foregoing preambles are hereby incorporated into this Agreement as if fully restated in this Section 1.

Section 2. Village Opt-Out.

Village has provided the notice required by Southcom ETSB bylaws to terminate as a Southcom ETSB member municipality and that upon approval of Cook County ETSB's consolidation plan by the State of Illinois' Office of the Statewide 9-1-1 Administrator, the Village shall become a member of Cook County ETSB.

Section 3. Wireless Call Boundaries.

Upon the Village becoming a Cook County ETSB member municipality, the wireless call boundaries of Cook County ETSB and Southcom ETSB shall change such that all wireless 9-1-1 calls originating in Village shall no longer be handled by Southcom ETSB and instead shall be handled by Cook County ETSB.

Section 4. Funds.

Once the consolidation plan is approved by the State of Illinois' Office of the Statewide 9-1-1 Administrator, Cook County ETSB shall receive all Funds attributable to the Village after the effective date of the Village becoming a member of Cook County ETSB in accordance with the Act. Cook County ETSB will be responsible for all Funds it receives and for the reporting and auditing of all Funds as described in Section 5 below.

Section 5. Financial Reporting of Funds.

Southcom ETSB shall be responsible for all required financial reporting relating to the Funds, including the financial report required by Section 40 of the Act, up to and including the date that Cook County ETSB's consolidation plan is approved by the State of Illinois' Office of the Statewide 9-1-1 Administrator. Thereafter, Cook County ETSB shall be responsible for all such reporting.

Section 6. Term.

The term of this Agreement shall commence on the Effective Date and shall end the later of (1) the date which is one (1) year after the date of approval of Cook County ETSB's consolidation plan by the State of Illinois' Office of the Statewide 9-1-1 Administrator or (2) the date upon which Southcom ETSB files the last financial report relating to funds attributable to Village as required by Section 5 hereof.

Section 7. Counterparts.

This Agreement may be executed in counterparts, each of which shall be deemed to be an original and both of which shall constitute one and the same Agreement.

Section 8. Severability.

If any part of this Agreement shall be held invalid for any reason, the remainder of this Agreement shall remain valid to the maximum extent possible.

Section 9. Governing Law.

This Agreement shall be governed by the laws of the State of Illinois without giving consideration to the principals of conflict of laws.

Section 10. Entire Agreement.

This Agreement represents the entire agreement between the Parties and there are no other promises or conditions in any other agreement whether oral or written.

COUNTY'S ENHANCED 9-1-1 EMERGENCY TELEPHONE SYSTEM ORDINANCE, AS AMENDED

WHEREAS, the State of Illinois has enacted into law the Emergency Telephone System Act, Ill. Rev. Stat. ch. 134, para. 30.01 et. seq. (the Act) and

WHEREAS, the Act enables a County to impose a surcharge on billed subscribers of network connections provided by telecommunications carriers at a rate per network connection in order to implement and maintain a "9-1-1" Emergency Telephone System: and

WHEREAS, the Act further provides that before the surcharge may be imposed it must be authorized by a majority of voters in a referendum by the County; and

WHEREAS, the County Board of Cook, its' President, and commissioners deem it to be in the best interest of the County to implement and maintain an enhanced "9-1-1" Emergency Telephone System and to impose a surcharge on billed subscribers of network connections provided by the telecommunications carriers to pay for the cost associated therewith;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the President and Board of Commissioners of the County of Cook, Cook County Illinois as follows:

NEW CHAPTER - Surcharge for Emergency 9-1-1 Telephone System

Section One

A surcharge is hereby imposed, subject to the provisions of Section Two, upon all telephone subscribers passed through telecommunication carriers engaged in the business of transmitting messages by means of electricity originating within the corporate limits of Cook County. However, the surcharge may not be imposed, unless requested by a municipality, in any incorporated area which has previously approved a surcharge, or in any incorporated area where the corporate authorities have previously entered into a binding contract or letter of intent with a telecommunications carrier to provide 9-1-1 service through municipal funds.

If simultaneous to approval of the county referendum contained in this ordinance, a municipality approves a substantially similar referendum authorizing a sucharge for 9-1-1 services to be provided by the municipality, this ordinance does not apply to that municipality.

Section Two

A referendum shall be placed by the Cook County Clerk on the April 20, 1993, ballot for all legal voters residing in the Unincorporated areas of Cook County and Municipalities of Berkeley, Golf, Ford Heights, Northlake, Phoenix, Robbins, and Stone Park, to vote upon the following question:

Shall the County of Cook impose a surcharge of up to one and 25/100 dollars (\$1.25) per month per network connection, which surcharge will be added to the monthly bill you receive for telephone	: YES :	
or telecommunications charges for the purpose of installing a 9-1-1 Emergency Telephone System	: : NO	

Section Three

If a majority of the votes cast upon the question are in favor thereof, a surcharge is hereby imposed at a rate of \$1.25 per month per in service network connection, as hereinafter defined.

Section Four

As used in this Ordinance, the following terms shall have the following meanings: a)"network connection" and "transmitting messages" shall have the same meanings as in the Emergency Telephone System Act, III, Rev. Stat. ch. 134, para. 30.01 ct seq. (1991); b) "telecommunications carrier" shall have the same meaning as III. Rev. Stat. ch. 111 2/3, para. 13-202; c) "board" means the Emergency Telephone System Board of Cook County created pursuant to Section 12 of this Ordinance.

Section Five

The Cook County Clerk shall provide any telecommunication carrier subject to the surcharge with a certified list of those network connections assigned to the municipalities or county to be exempt from imposition of the surcharge. The certified list may be revised by the County of Cook on 60 days prior written notice provided to the telecommunication carriers.

Section Six

The surcharge shall be imposed on the first day of the month following the expiration of 90 days from the date of the Cook County Clerk certifies to the individual telecommunication carriers subject to the surcharge that the referendum referred to in Section Two has passed.

Section Seven

Each telecommunications carrier is hereby authorized and instructed to recover accounting and collection charge, as provided in Section 8, by deducting 3% from the gross amount of surcharge collected otherwise due and owing the County of Cook prior to remittance under Section Eight of this ordinance.

Section Eight

The amount of surcharge collected by the telecommunications carrier shall be paid to the Emergency Telephone System Board of Cook County not fater than 30 days after the surcharge is collected, net of any network or other 9-1-1 or sophisticated 9-1-1 system charges then due the particular telecommunication carrier, as shown on an itemized bill and as previously agreed upon by the Board and the carrier and the 3% accounting and collection charge described in Section Seven.

Section Nine

Simultaneously with the remittance described in Section Eight above each telecommunication carrier shall make a return to the Cook County Treasurer for the period to which the remittance applies stating as follows:

- 1. The name of the telecommunication carrier.
- 2. The telecommunication carrier's principal place of business.
- 3. The number of network connections to which the surcharge applies.
- 4. The amount of surcharge due.

5. Such other reasonable and related information such as the corporate authorities may require.

Section Ten

If it shall appear that an amount of surcharge has been paid which was not due under the provisions of this ordinance, whether as the result of a mistake of fact or an error of law, then such amount shall be credited against any surcharge due, or to become due, under this ordinance from the telecommunication carrier who made the erroneous payments; provided that no amounts erroneously paid more than three(3) years prior to the filing of a claim therefore shall be so credited. Ninety days prior notice shall be given to the Emergency Telephone System Board on any credit against a surcharge due.

Section Eleven

No action to recover any amount of surcharge due under the provisions of this ordinance shall be commenced more than three (3) years after the due date of such amount.

Section Twelve

.

Upon approval of the referendum, the Emergency Telephone Board System of Cook County shall be established. The Board shall consist of not fewer than five members, appointed by the President of the Cook County Board of Commissioners and approved by the Board of Commissioners. At least three members of the Board shall be representative of the 9-1-1 public safety agencies, including but not limited to police departments, fire departments, emergency medical services providers, and emergency services and disaster agencies, and appointed on the basis of their ability or experience. Elected officials are also eligible to serve on the board. Members of the board shall serve without compensation but shall be reimbursed for their actual and necessary expenses. Any 2 or more municipalities, counties, or combination thereof, that impose a surcharge may, instead of establishing individual boards, establish by intergovernmental agreement a Joint Emergency Telephone System Board pursuant to this Section. The manner of appointment of such a joint board shall be prescribed in the agreement.

The Board's powers and duties shall include, but are not limited to the following:

I. Planning a 9-1-1 system.

2. Coordinating and supervising the implementation, upgrading or maintenance of the system, including the establishment of equipment specifications and coding systems.

3. Receiving monies from the surcharge imposed under this Ordinance, and from any other source, for deposit into the Emergency Telephone System Fund.

4. Authorizing all disbursements from the fund.

5. Hiring, on a temporary basis, any staff necessary for the implementation or upgrade of the system.

All monies received by a board pursuant to a surcharge imposed under this Ordinance shall be deposited into a separate interest bearing Emergency Telephone System Fund account. The Cook County Treasurer shall be custodian of the fund. All interest accruing on the fund shall remain in the fund. No expenditures may be made from such fund except upon the direction of the board by resolution passed by a majority of all members of the board. Expenditures may be made only to pay for the costs associated with the following:

1. The design of the Emergency Telephone System.

2. The coding of an initial Master Street Address Guide database, and update and maintenance thereof.

3. The repayment of any monics advanced for the implementation of the system.

4. The charges for Automatic Number Identification and Automatic Location Identification equipment, and maintenance, replacement and update thereof.

5. The non-recurring charges related to installation of the Emergency Telephone System and the ongoing network charges.

6. Other products and services necessary for the implementation, upgrade and maintenance of the system and any other purpose related to the operation of the system, including costs attributable directly to the construction, leasing, or maintenance of any buildings or facilities or costs of personnel attributable directly to the operation of the system. Costs attributable directly to the operation of an emergency telephone system do not include the costs of public safety agency personnel who are and equipment that is dispatched in response to an emergency call.

The Board shall complete the database before implementation of the 9-1-1 system. The error ratio of the database shall not at any time exceed 1% of the total database.

Section Thirteen

Civil Liability

No public agency or public safety agency, nor any officer, agent or employee of any public agency or public safety agency, shall be liable for any civil damages as a result of any act or omission, except willful or wanton misconduct, in connection with developing, adopting, operating or implementing any plan or system required by this Ordinance.

No person who gives emergency instructions through a system established under this Ordinance to persons rendering services in an emergency at another location, nor any person following such instructions in rendering such services, shall be liable for any civil damages as a result of issuing or following the instructions, unless issuing or following the instructions constitutes willful or wanton misconduct.

This Section may not be offered as a defense in any judicial proceeding brought by the Attorney General to, compel compliance under Section 12 of the Emergency Telephone Systems Act.

Section Fourieen

The County shall not expend any County funds for the implementation, installation and maintenance or other related costs attributable to providing a 9-1-1 emergency system for the citizens of Cook County. However, the County may pay for the personnel necessary to operate the 9-1-1 system.

Section Fifteen

Any and all ordinances in conflict herewith, be and the same are hereby repealed.

Section Sixteen

As provided in Section One of this ordinance, and pursuant to the October 11, 2001 request by the Village of Dixmoor to be included in the Cook County 9-1-1 system, upon approval by the Illinois Commerce Commission all telecommunication carriers shall be notified to impose the County surcharge rate of \$1.25 per month per in service network connection, to all customers located within the Village of Dixmoor.

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4). NORTHWIST agrees to contact this said Supervisor with any EMURCBNCY calls deeding dispatch, transmitting directly an aradio provided by the COUNTY RTSD and located at NORTHWIST.

5). COUNTY Patrol Supervisor will be responsible for adapting back to NORTHWHST the call number(s) of the appropriate COUNTY Bort Officer that will respond to the BMBRCHINCY call. NORTHWBST then agrees to disputch this officer(s) to the proding BMBRCHINCY call.

6). NORTHWEST agrees to maintain radio communication, on the cartipment provided by the COUNTY BYSD, with any officer responding to or involved in an RMBROANCY shuation.
