Illinois State Police Annual Report

2007



On October 28, 2007, at approximately 2:49 a.m., District 9 Trooper Brian McMillen was responding to a request by Sangamon County Deputies for assistance in quelling a disturbance involving a large crowd at a local bar. While responding with his emergency lights and siren activated, Trooper McMillen encountered an oncoming vehicle driving in his lane of travel. Although he took evasive action, his squad car was sideswiped by the wrong way vehicle, causing his squad car to rotate 90 degrees in a clockwise direction. The car then began sliding sideways in the opposite lane at oncoming traffic when it was struck in the driver's side door by a second vehicle. Tragically, Trooper McMillen was fatally injured. The other two drivers involved in the incident were subsequently arrested and charged with Aggravated Driving Under the Influence, Reckless Homicide, and a variety of other traffic charges.

Trooper McMillen graduated from Cadet Class #113 on February 2, 2007, having served as President of his cadet class. He grew up in Pana, Illinois, and after high school, attended the University of Illinois, Springfield, where he received a Bachelors Degree in Criminal Justice in 2005.

Trooper McMillen not only served the citizens and visitors of the state of Illinois, he was also a proud member of the Illinois Air National Guard serving as a Tech Sergeant with the 183rd Security Forces Squadron Fighter Wing. He enlisted in the Illinois Air National Guard in 2000 and served three separate overseas deployments, the first being in 2002 where he served in Saudi Arabia as part of Operation South Watch. The second occurred in 2003 when he was deployed to Romania as part of Iraqi Freedom. Finally, in 2005, he was deployed to Italy.

He is survived by his wife, Angela, his parents, and ten siblings.



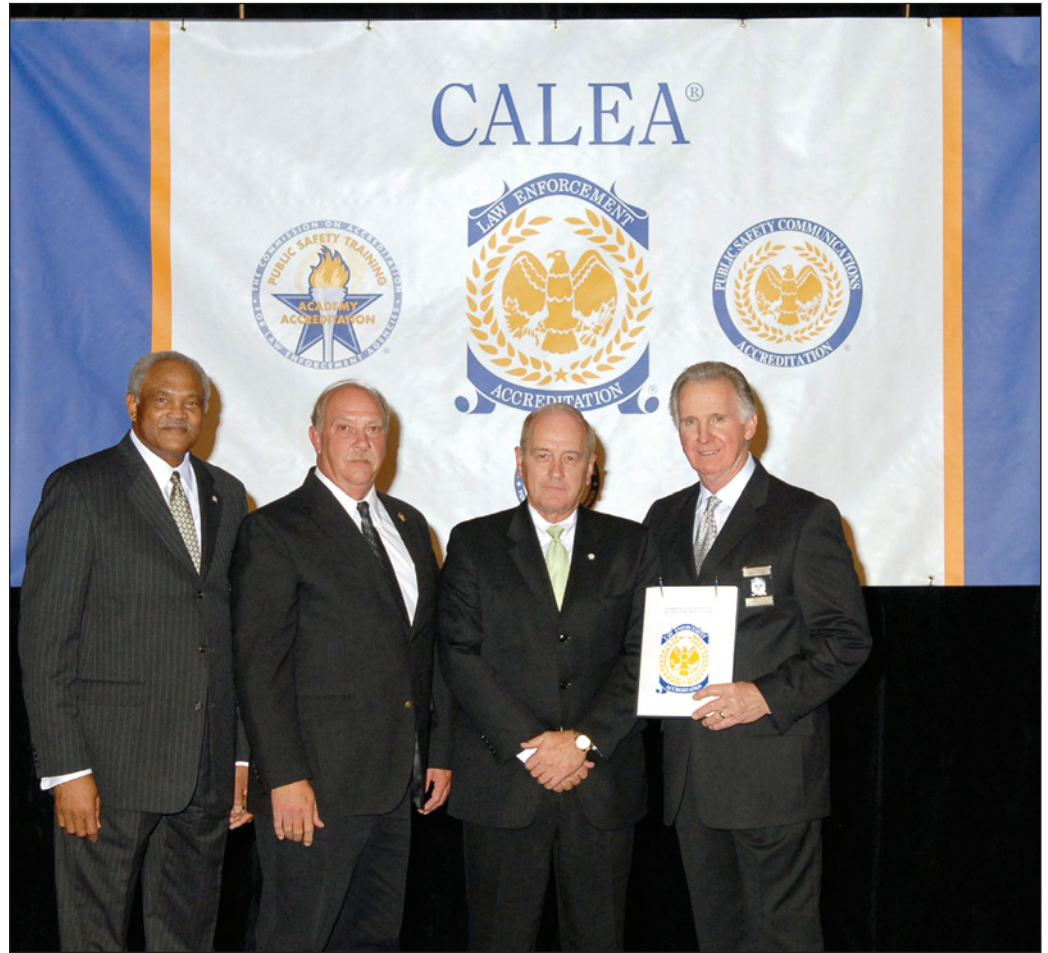

Re-Accreditation

The Illinois State Police was awarded re-accreditation status by the Commission on Accreditation for Law Enforcement Agencies, Inc. (CALEA) on November 17, 2007, during a conference held in Colorado Springs, Colorado. CALEA accreditation is a highly-prized recognition throughout the law enforcement community and ensures the ISP continues to serve Illinois residents with professional excellence. This is the sixth consecutive accreditation status award for the ISP since the initial award on June 15, 1986, when the agency became the first state police agency accredited by the Commission.

The ISP also received two additional awards from the Commission, both of which exemplify its dedication in maintaining the highest level of professional services to the citizenry and criminal justice community. The CALEA Flagship Agency Award was presented to the ISP for having continually demonstrated excellence in commitment to the accreditation process, and a willingness to assist other law enforcement agencies in obtaining accreditation status with 457 internationally recognized law enforcement standards. The Meritorious Award was presented to the ISP for maintaining accreditation status for more than 15 consecutive years.



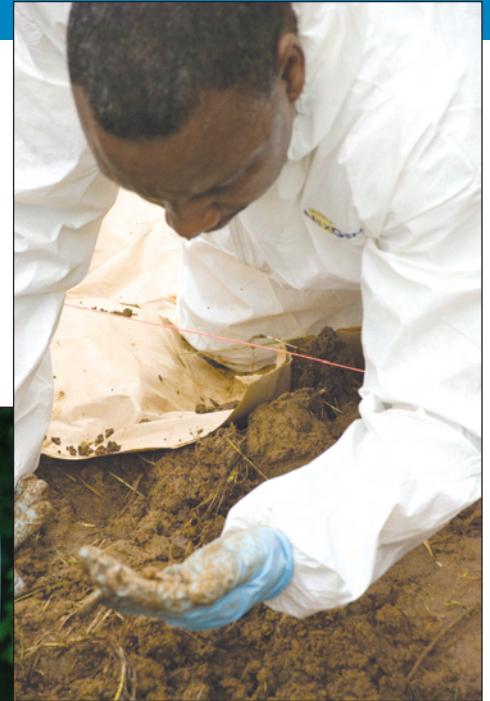

Forensic Services Accreditations

The Division of Forensic Services, Crime Scene Services Command (CSSC) reached a major milestone in 2007 by becoming the first stand-alone crime scene unit in the U.S. to receive accreditation from Forensic Quality Services – International. This accreditation was attained by complying with International Organization of Standards (ISO) standards. The ISO accreditation means CSSC policies conform to a rigorous set of standards, and CSSC personnel can prove its procedures conform to those policies. Law enforcement agencies, state's attorneys, jurors, and victims can count on the evidence processed and collected by Crime Scene Investigators will be consistent with carefully developed, internationally-vetted criteria. This means that the work performed by CSSC personnel will withstand scrutiny where it counts most – in court. This achievement reflects the integrity, service, and pride of the Illinois State Police crime scene personnel.

In 2007, the Forensic Sciences Command successfully passed their first ISO reaccreditation audits. All eight operational laboratories, as well as the Research and Development Laboratory, are accredited for another four years. This ISO accreditation provides assurances of the high quality work being done by the forensic laboratories.

A New Beginning Relocation of Central Headquarters



The Division of Administration (DOA) spearheaded one of the most aggressive undertakings during 2007 with the ISP's move from the old Central Headquarters to the new Central Headquarters.

This monumental task was accomplished with the assistance from various work units within the ISP. Working closely with the Governor's Office and Department of Central Management Services, acquisition of the new Central Headquarters (CHQ) was finalized in 2006, with the successful move taking place during the Spring/Summer of 2007. Before the relocation of approximately 250 employees from the old Central Headquarters, many hours of pre-work were devoted to the relocation, including developing floor plans, installing telecommunication and computer lines, and developing security measures. The move was the culmination of the ISP working for more than 20 years to replace or renovate the aging old Central Headquarters, or find a new facility.

The new CHQ sits on approximately 9.8 acres and is comprised of four office buildings (429,915 square feet) and a warehouse facility (50,885 square feet). The primary complex consists of the North Building (opened in 1913); South Building (opened in 1948); Annex Building (opened in 1952); and Seventh Street Building, referred to as the Main Building, (opened in 1965). Total parking lot space is 280,421 square feet or 6.4 acres.

Immediately following the move of personnel from the Armory Building, the DOA began the planning process for the 2008 relocation of ISP offices from leased space in Springfield. Once all moves are completed, more than 900 employees will report to the Central Headquarters Complex.



Memorial Park

The Illinois State Police Heritage Foundation (ISPHF) ceremonially accepted a 1.5 acre park in September 2007 from AIG American General. The ISPHF intends to construct a memorial in the park dedicated to honor the lives and memories of the fallen heroes of the Illinois State Police. The park, formerly known as Becker Park, is located immediately north of the ISP Central Headquarters in Springfield. The ISPHF is a not-for-profit organization dedicated to preserving the legacy of the ISP and its employees. Established in 2000, the Foundation financed and constructed a museum in Springfield which is open to the public and provides a display of vehicles and items used by the ISP throughout its 85-year history. A Memorial Park Committee comprised of members from all ISP divisions and fraternal organizations was formed by the ISPHF. Members serve on a volunteer basis and oversee the funding, design, and construction of the memorial.

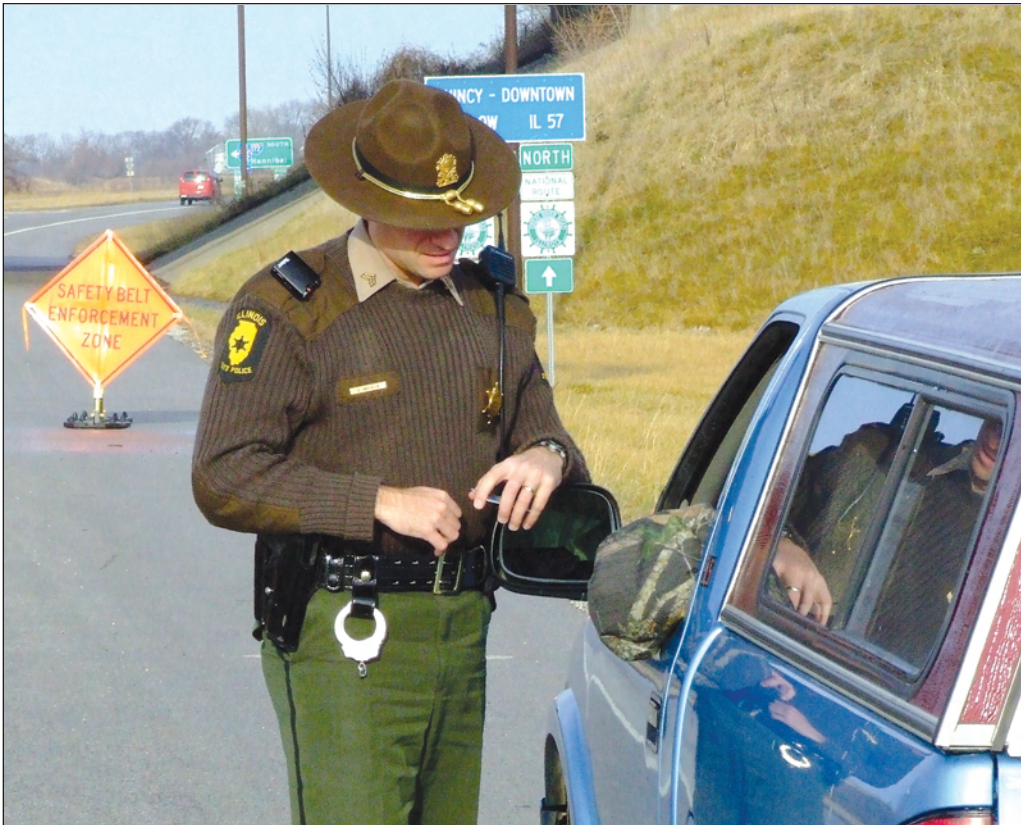

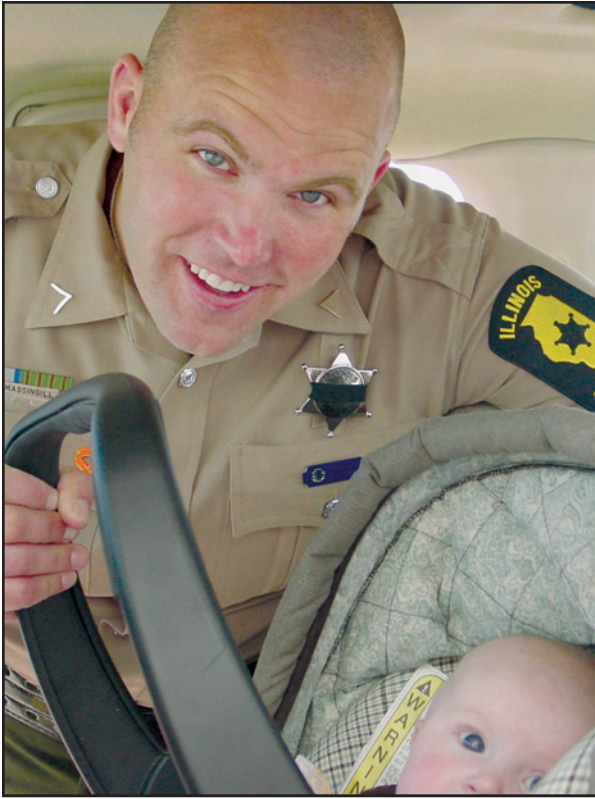

The Move Over Law

The Move Over Law, also known as “Scott’s Law,” was enacted in memory of Lieutenant Scott Gillen of the Chicago Fire Department who was struck and killed in 2000 by an intoxicated driver on the Dan Ryan Expressway.

The Move Over Law requires motorists to yield to moving emergency vehicles, including highway maintenance vehicles, displaying oscillating, rotating, or flashing lights. Additionally, drivers are required to change lanes (if safe to do so) or reduce speed and proceed with caution when approaching a stationary emergency vehicle displaying flashing warning lights.

District 8 Trooper Lanny Finn was seriously injured after his squad car (photo, right) was struck by a semi tractor/trailer while he was on the shoulder of the interstate with his emergency lights activated assisting a tow truck operator. Trooper Finn sustained a concussion, broken left wrist, and left knee injuries as a result of the crash. He was off recovering from his injuries from December 5, 2006, until remarkably returning to full-duty status on May 1, 2007. Trooper Finn’s wrecked squad was displayed on numerous occasions in 2007 to remind motorists first-hand of the serious consequences which can occur by not “moving over.”

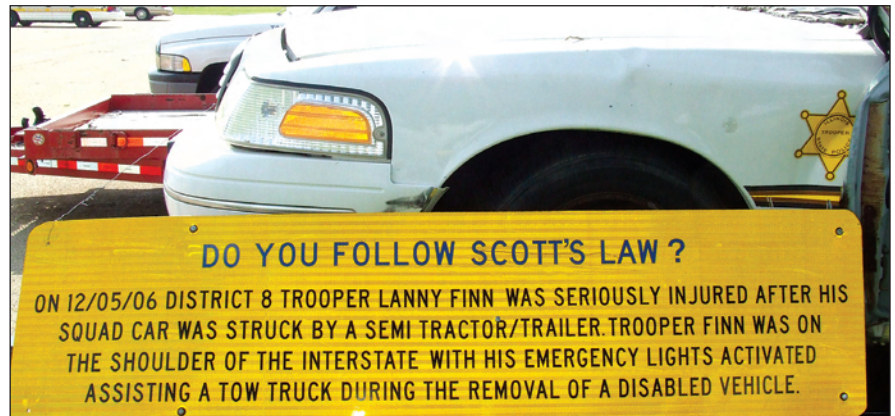
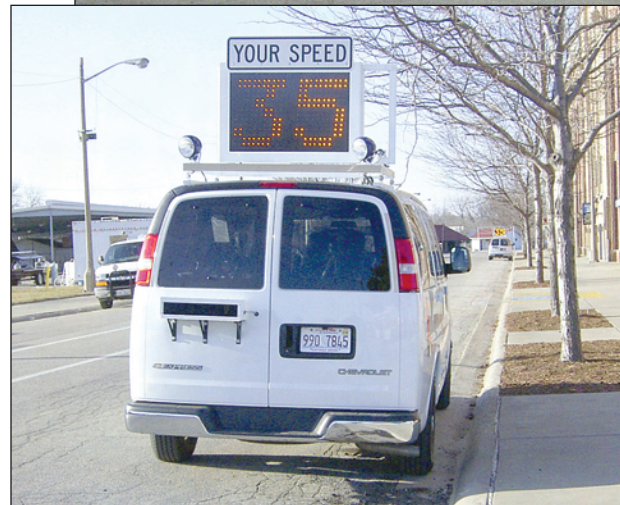


Photo Speed Enforcement

In 2004, legislation was passed to implement a program called Work Zone Photo Speed Enforcement. In 2006, a partnership between the ISP and Illinois Department of Transportation was created to implement the program. Photo Speed Enforcement vans are a state-of-the-art tool staffed by specially-trained Troopers. The marked white Photo Speed Enforcement vans are equipped with the latest in photo radar technology designed to record the speed of vehicles and to capture clear images of the driver and the license plate. After a speeding violation has occurred, the enforcement van will capture a photo of the driver, vehicle, and front and rear registration plate. The information is verified by the vendor and the on-duty officer, and citations are then sent by certified mail to drivers within 14 business days. Photo Enforcement vans were deployed in 2007 in District Chicago, as well as Districts 5, 11, and 15; and 2,719 citations were issued. Under the toughened work zone speeding fines, a first time offender faces a \$375 fine while second time offenders face a \$1,000 fine and a 90-day suspension of their driver's license. Anyone convicted of hitting a construction worker faces a \$10,000 fine and up to 14 years in prison.

Every year, there are more than 7,000 crashes and 2,800 traffic-related injuries that occur in Illinois work zones. However, through engineering and enforcement efforts, steady progress has been made in reducing the number of fatalities in our work zones.

STARCOM 21

After seven years of planning and effort, the state's new voice radio system, **ST**ate **R**adio **COM**munications for the **21st** Century became operational statewide. The transition of District Chicago, District 2, and the Tollway on September 18, 2007, capped the state's efforts to replace the assortment of decades-old networks used by various agencies with a single-system platform which supports the state's communications needs.

Schaumburg-based Motorola, Inc. owns and operates the system which was designed and constructed in close cooperation not only with the ISP, but the Department of Central Management Services, Department of Natural Resources, Toll Highway Authority, Illinois Department of Transportation, and other state agencies which use voice radio communications. The state agencies provided the Motorola engineering staff with a listing of functional requirements which were then addressed in the system design process. ISP's needs were based upon survey responses received from the field and the work of a number of project committees, especially the Operational Requirements and Interoperability Committees.

Reaching this milestone involved the work of more than 600 ISP officers and code



employees, many by participation on one of the developmental committees which addressed operational requirements, technology, procurement preparation, interoperability, and transition.

STARCOM21 is the most-tested voice radio system ever implemented. The contract with Motorola requires that an officer be able to access the system from a mobile radio in 95 percent of the geographic area of the state and from a portable radio in designated metropolitan areas.

STARCOM21 has been designed to consider the interoperability requirements of the ISP and allow communications with a variety of other federal, state, and local agencies. The base ISP operating template exceeds federal recommendations for interoperability.

Cadet Classes

During 2007, 149 men and women took the oath of an Illinois State Police Officer as members of three Cadet Classes to graduate from the Academy. Cadet Class 113 graduated on February 2, with 51 new Troopers; 35 members of CC 114 graduated on October 19; and 63 officers from CC 115 graduated on December 21.

ISP Cadets must successfully complete an intensive 26-week training period where they undergo a regimen of physical and classroom instruction, which includes training in Terrorism Awareness, Domestic Violence, Critical Incident Response, Firearms Training, First Responder Certification, Illinois Vehicle Code, Criminal Law, Motor Carrier Safety, Emergency Pursuit Driving, Juvenile Law, Police Response to Mental Illness, and more.

Brown's Chicken Murders

The 1993 mass murder of seven individuals at a Brown's Chicken & Pasta Restaurant in Palatine, Illinois, went to trial for the first of two suspects in March 2007. Forensic Science Center at Chicago Group Supervisor Debora Depczynski and Section Chief Cecilia Doyle testified to the biology and DNA analysis conducted on the case. The analysis of chicken bones recovered from the crime scene back in 1993 linked the DNA profile of suspect, Juan Luna, to a DNA profile identified on the chicken bones. Forensic Scientist John Onstwedder provided testimony on his latent print analysis of a napkin recovered from the crime scene and was able to identify Juan Luna's palm print on the napkin.

In October of 2007, the International Association of Chiefs' of Police (IACP) awarded Group Supervisor Depczynski, Section Chief Doyle and Forensic Scientist Barbara Wilson (deceased) the 2007 August Vollmer Award for Excellence in Forensic Science for their work on the Brown's Chicken murder case.

Due to the excellent work of Forensic Science Center at Chicago staff, both the DNA profile identified on chicken bones and the palm print identification played a key role in associating defendant Juan Luna to the murders. The defendant was found guilty and sentenced to life in prison.

Dan Ryan Construction Project

Starting April 1, 2006 through November 1, 2007, District Chicago assisted with traffic safety enforcement during one of the nation's largest construction projects, the \$1 billion Dan Ryan Expressway reconstruction. During that time frame, traffic lanes were rebuilt and an additional lane was added in each direction, rebuilding the 16-lane expressway. At full capacity, the Dan Ryan carries 300,000 vehicles daily through the heart of Chicago's South Side. During the project, hireback details ran 24 hours a day with one Master Sergeant and five officers assigned to patrol functions each shift. During the 19-month construction period, 50,795 citations and 33,921 written warnings were issued including 135 arrests for Driving Under the Influence and 330 criminal arrests. Officers handled 2,870 traffic crashes, including five fatalities during the construction.

District 7 Narcotics Seizures

During calendar year 2007, District 7 Troopers made 30 major narcotics seizures and leads the nation along the I-80 corridor with major narcotic seizures. The District 7 Criminal Patrol (CRIMPAT) program has always proven to be a strong tool in the war against drugs. The I-80 corridor continues to provide a rich supply of people that want to make easy money by trafficking illegal drugs. Troopers in District 7 have shown they have the ability and the enthusiasm

to reduce the supply of illegal drugs flowing into and through the state of Illinois. In 2007, District 7 officers seized over 788,000 grams of cannabis, 326,200 grams of cocaine, 8,500 grams of heroin, and more than \$1.2 million in cash.

A traffic stop by a District 7 Sergeant on May 17, 2007, resulted in the seizure of 385 pounds of BC Bud cannabis, a 2004 Dodge Ram 2500 pickup truck, and \$2,300. Zone 2 Agents were able to gain cooperation from the defendant, and gathered information that led to the seizure of an additional \$63,230 from a downtown Chicago storage locker. The defendant continued cooperation with Zone 2 Agents who teamed up with the Drug Enforcement Agency and Zone 1 and conducted a controlled delivery to Danvers, MA, where an additional \$127,830 USC was seized and other conspirators identified. At the same time as the Danvers, MA, seizure, a ruse controlled delivery was conducted in downtown New York City with the defendant e-mailing via a BlackBerry device, which resulted in another conspirator being apprehended. As part of the defendant's sentencing, she agreed to the seizure of \$128,644 and \$18,547 from two different Canadian bank accounts. This organization operated out of Canada with connections throughout the United States and used the defendant to transport cannabis and currency for the organization.

\$345,000 Currency Seizure

On March 21, 2007, District 6 Troopers were conducting motor carrier safety inspections at the I-74 westbound scales when a truck tractor pulling a car trailer carrying four vehicles pulled to the scales. It was directed to the rear of the scales for an inspection and numerous errors in the driver's log book were identified. A K-9 alerted on the truck and after a probable cause search, 30 shrink wrapped bundles of currency were located. The driver refused any level of cooperation; however, the currency and vehicle were seized pursuant to the investigation.

District 9 Criminal Patrol Team

The District 9 CRIMPAT team is focused on criminal activities along the Interstates. Their efforts were very successful in 2007 with a total of 16 criminal interdictions for the year. The month of February was particularly successful with 2,034 grams of heroin,

19,370 grams of cocaine, 572,040 grams of cannabis, and \$6,500 USC seized. The illegal drugs totaled over \$6 million in street value.

Two significant traffic stops netted these illegal substances. During one incident, a Trooper stopped a Mercury Mountaineer for following too closely and improper lane usage. After conflicting stories from the occupants, consent to search was granted, resulting in the Trooper locating 370 grams of cocaine under the dashboard and 2,034

grams of heroin in a false compartment of the car battery.

On the second stop, a Trooper stopped a truck tractor semi-trailer combination for an equipment violation. Upon consent to search, the Trooper located 572,040 grams of cannabis and 19,000 grams of cocaine in the load of avocados in the semi-trailer.

In 2007, the District 9 team seized 692,510 grams of cannabis, 22,213 grams of cocaine, 2,358 grams of heroin, 4 grams of meth, 97 ecstasy pills, and 3 grams of diazepam.

Ecstasy Bust

Due to an exhaustive and cooperative investigation between the Quad-City Metropolitan Enforcement Group (QCMG), Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA), and various law enforcement agencies in Iowa, a multi-state drug trafficking organization was dismantled that supplied the Quad-City area with tens of thousands of ecstasy pills. Over the course of the 18 plus month investigation, four search warrants were executed, five

consensual searches conducted, two buy-bust operations completed, and a QCMEG Agent was able to successfully confiscate over \$25,000 of drug proceeds from a member of the drug trafficking organization during an undercover meeting.

At the conclusion of these coordinated efforts, a 70,000 pill ecstasy conspiracy investigation yielded 13 federal defendants from five different states and the seizure of 16,531 ecstasy pills. Also seized were 719 grams of high-grade cannabis, \$53,980 USC,

and a Mazda RX8. As the investigation continued into 2008, the defendants were cooperating with the DEA.

Seizure of 2,790 pounds of Cannabis

On July 22, 2007, at approximately 7:33 a.m. a District 11 Trooper stopped a truck tractor semi-trailer for traffic violations. The Trooper

obtained permission to search the vehicle and located 2,790 pounds of cannabis secreted in with the load of soap and cookies. The suspect cooperated and the load was delivered to its destination in the Chicago area.

FusionX

In December 2007, Microsoft Corporation and the Illinois State Police unveiled a glimpse of the first generation law enforcement intelligence fusion center architecture codenamed "FusionX" at Microsoft's Homeland Security and Public Safety Technology Symposium. A fusion center is a terrorism prevention and response center designed to create information sharing across governmental jurisdictions. Stemming from a year-long effort to establish best practices and architectural approaches, FusionX is a blueprint for horizontal collaboration services to enable analysts to intake, process, and disseminate information related to criminal and terrorism intelligence and information.

The genesis of FusionX was a mutually conceived initiative by the Illinois State Police and Microsoft to develop a fusion center architecture solution from the bottom up based on a deep understanding of state and local missions and operations. Ultimately, FusionX will lead to an "all threats, all crimes, all hazards" architecture that enables standards-based connections

and collaboration among federal, state, local, tribal, and private organizations.

The Illinois State Police collaborated with Microsoft to develop FusionX concepts and test them in a working proof of concept architecture. The horizontal architecture performs a range of information fusion operations needed to support countering traditional crime, narcotics trafficking, terrorism and for delivering support for all-hazards missions. Specifically, the FusionX approach seeks to advance best practices, technology architecture and standards for fusion center infrastructure, business process automation and internal and external collaboration.

Medicaid Fraud Control Unit

In 2007, the Illinois Medicaid Fraud Control Unit (MFCU) increased productivity and continued to maintain its reputation as one of the leading Medicaid Fraud Control Units in the United States. Compared to 2006, total recoveries more than doubled to nearly \$13.9 million in 2007, and the efforts of MFCU and Task Force members resulted in increases in every major category. The accomplishments of 2007 were achieved with a staffing level that did not increase from 2006.

During 2007, the number of abuse and neglect cases opened increased 25% from 2006 and made up 52.7% of all cases opened. Fraud case openings were up 13.5% and patient funds cases increased 50% compared to 2006.

Criminal recoveries in 2007 were up over ten times the amount recovered in 2006 and more than \$6.2 million was recovered in restitution, fines, and other court orders as a result of criminal convictions, compared to \$584,563 in 2006.

Civil recoveries were up 22% to over \$7.6 million, compared to \$6.25 million in 2006.

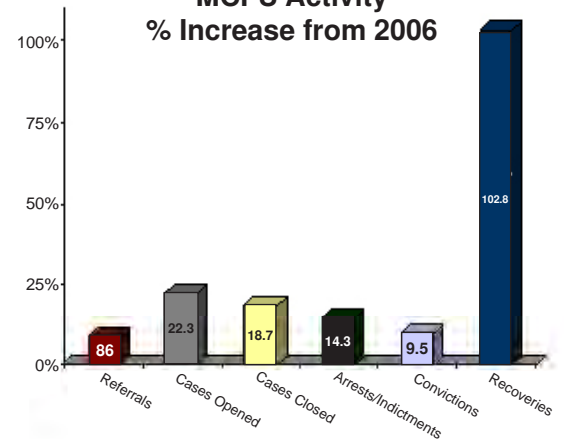

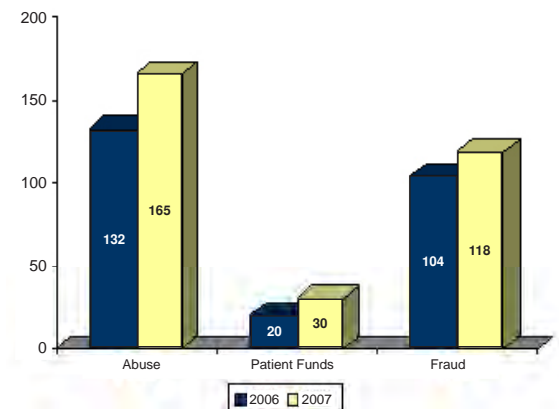

Stay Alive on the I's

The Illinois State Police and Illinois Department of Transportation, Division of Traffic Safety, boosted their efforts to increase safety on the roadways during the 2007 Memorial Day weekend when they instituted a new highway safety initiative coined "Stay Alive On I-55".

On Friday, May 25, the ISP saturated I-55 with Troopers every 10 miles from St. Louis to Chicago from noon and until midnight. The goal of the enforcement initiative was to reduce the number of crashes on I-55 by focusing on the fatal five violations (speeding, seat belts, DUI, improper lane usage and following too closely) and Scott's Law (the move over law) violations.

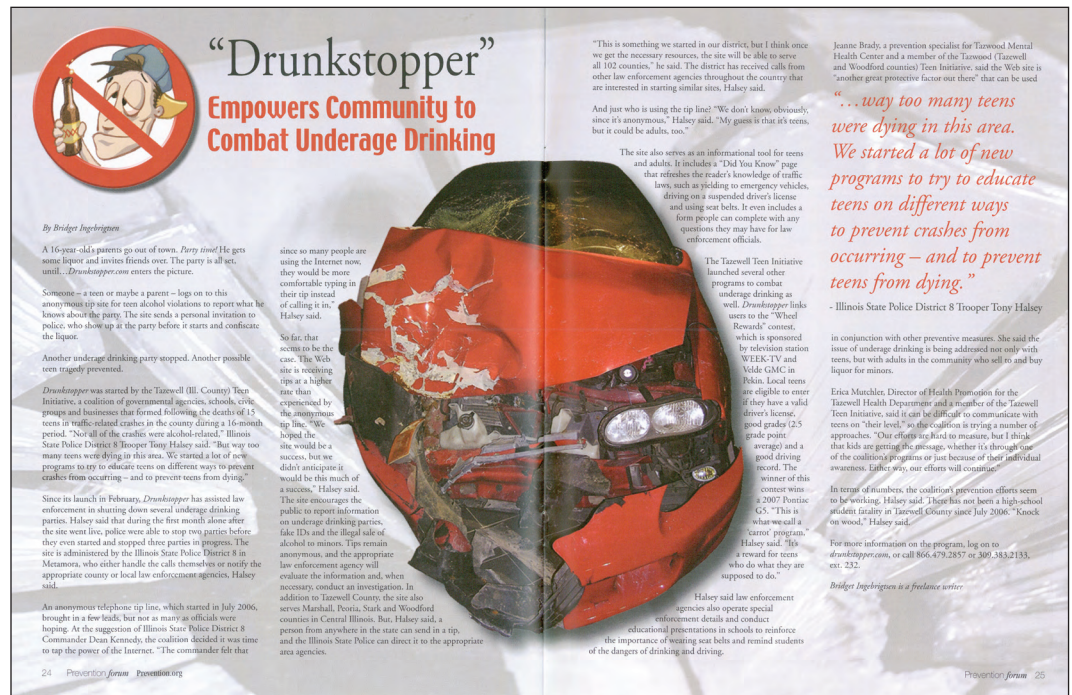
The Memorial Day "Stay Alive On I-55" initiative was so successful that the ISP took the initiative statewide during the 2007 Labor Day weekend by starting a "Stay Alive on the I's" program. A Trooper patrolled every ten miles on all Illinois interstates from 2 p.m. until midnight on the Friday before the holiday, and from 10 a.m. until 8 p.m. on Labor Day. The hours of the detail reflected when traffic was anticipated to be at its heaviest.

District 8 Underage Drinking Initiative

In February 2007, District 8 launched the DrunkStopper web site www.drunkstopper.com as a resource to receive anonymous tips on underage drinking parties taking place in the five counties located within the district. The goal of the program is to reduce the number of underage drinkers, which in turn will reduce the number of teen fatal crashes involving alcohol. The web site, along with a toll free telephone number, 866/479-2857, has resulted in several tips and numerous arrests of underage drinkers. This initiative was the result of a cooperative effort between law enforcement, community leaders, and businesses coming together after a 16-month period that resulted in the tragic deaths of 15 teenagers in Tazewell County. All tips are investigated by ISP personnel or passed along to the responsible jurisdiction for follow-up. The toll free tip hotline has also been an avenue for teens and/or parents to report underage drinking parties.

Commercial Vehicle Enforcement

In 2007, the Commercial Vehicle Section conducted a series of four commercial vehicle enforcement blitzes. Each blitz consisted of an aggressive three-day enforcement campaign focused on detection and removal of unsafe commercial vehicles and drivers from Illinois' highways. Each blitz included activities to reduce commercial vehicle speeds, increase seat belt compliance, and determine compliance with driver qualification and hours of service requirements. In addition, a secondary emphasis was placed on hazardous materials transportation, size and weight requirements, and Scott's Law violations.

During each of the blitzes, Commercial Vehicle Enforcement Officers completed 9,192 inspections. Of those conducted, 1,979, or 21.5 percent, resulted in a vehicle and/or driver out-of-service violation. District officers contributed by inspecting 1,190 vehicles and placing 25 vehicles and 26 drivers out-of-service. Officers also cited 850 violations for speed and 51 citations for safety belts.



I-74 Gasoline Tanker Explosion

On July 7, 2007, a truck tractor tanker hauling gasoline crashed on an I-74 bridge one mile west of Downs. The crash involved an intense explosion, resulting in the death of the driver. The tanker collided with a cement bridge compromising the structure, and the explosion shut down both lanes on I-74 threatening the safety of nearby residents. The response to the incident involved the ISP, local and county law enforcement agencies, IDOT, Coroner's Office, Illinois Environmental Protection Agency, McLean County Emergency Management, and multiple county officials to help coordinate an extensive detour. Assessments determined area residents were not at risk; however, damage to the highway was visibly extensive. Inspections of the impacted bridges following the fire's extinguishment determined the westbound side bridge could not be reopened. After a three-month rural detour, both east and westbound bridges were reopened in October.

Internet Crimes Unit

On October 5, 2006, the Illinois State Police unveiled a new plan to fight internet crime by announcing the creation of the Internet Crimes Unit (ICU). The ICU web site provides the public and law enforcement officials with an avenue to report cyber crimes nationally. The web site, www.isp.state.il.us/icu, includes online complaint filing, community awareness and education, safety tips, identity theft prevention, tips on internet scams, as well as links to Illinois statutes and legislation related to internet crime.

In February 2007, the ICU web page went on-line as a one-stop-shop for complaints regarding computer-related criminal activity. From February through December, the web page received a total of 1,517 complaints from the public. Of those cases, 891 were closed, 546 were referred to other agencies, and 80 are still pending.

During 2007, the ICU developed and implemented a marketing campaign to educate the public to inform the citizens about the Unit. The campaign included radio advertisements and public service announcements, print media, billboard advertisement, and bumper stickers displayed on ISP squad cars.

NETSMARTZ

Also unveiled in February 2007 were NetSmartz training workshops. This educational tool combines the newest technologies and current research in high-impact educational activities to teach kids and teens how to stay safe online. District Safety Education Officers present the free internet safety training to schools, parents groups, and civic organizations. During 2007, 379 NetSmartz training sessions were presented to more than 18,000 students, teachers, parent groups, and civic organizations.

NetSmartz was created by the National Center for Missing and Exploited Children and the Boys and Girls Club of America. The program is an age-based educational program designed for K-12 students and their parents. The program is presented to schools, parent groups, civic organizations, and others with a desire to learn safe internet surfing techniques.

Motorcycle Enforcement Bureau

The Motorcycle Enforcement Bureau (MEB) continues to focus on fatal five violations (speeding, seat belts, DUI, improper lane usage and following too closely) predominantly on the interstate system. In addition to the enforcement details, the MEB also implemented a number of motorcycle awareness campaigns including five media events with associated enforcement details and filming motorcycle safety public service announcements which were aired on a weekly television show geared toward motorcycle enthusiasts. Although the MEB staffing level was established for 42 officers, the MEB operated with an average of 37 officers who are assigned to six platoons that geographically patrol all of Illinois' interstate system.

The MEB operates under a central command ensuring optimal interstate visibility and enforcement effectiveness. MEB officers patrol more than 138,000 miles of the state's streets, highways, and interstates on issued Harley Davidson motorcycles and

are capable of handling a variety of assignments, including rapid response through congested roadways, improved crash response, parades, escorts, and public relations. The most notable attributes of motorcycles are their agility, maneuverability, and ease of concealment which makes them ideally

suited for traffic monitoring, observation, and ultimately enforcement. The cost effectiveness of motorcycles versus traditional police squad cars cannot be discounted in today's era of escalating fuel costs.

Fatal Five

The following five violations of the Illinois Vehicle Code have been attributed to an increase in fatal traffic crashes: speeding, seat belt non-compliance, improper lane usage, following too closely, and driving under the influence of alcohol/illegal drugs (DUI). These five violations are commonly referred to as the “fatal five.” In 2007, the Illinois State Police issued 354,245 citations for these violations and continue to aggressively enforce the fatal five and other violations to reduce the total number of fatal motor vehicle crashes on Illinois highways.

Meth Manufacturer Registry

The ISP created the Methamphetamine Manufacturer Registry as mandated by Public Act 94-0831 for the purpose of identifying methamphetamine manufacturers who were convicted of a violation of the Methamphetamine Control and Community Protection Act. To fulfill the provisions of the mandate, a link from the ISP home page to the Methamphetamine Manufacturer Registry was provided which allows anyone with internet access to find the names, dates of birth, county, and date of conviction and qualifying offense. Child Murderer and Violent Offender Against Youth Registry

Public Act 94-0945 mandated the ISP establish and maintain a statewide Child Murderer and Violent Offender Against Youth Registry, accessible on the internet. The database identifies violent offenders against youth who have been convicted of certain offenses and/or crimes against children and must register as a Violent Offender Against Youth. The data is searchable via a mapping system which identifies offenders living within a five-mile radius of an identified address. Sex Offender Registry

Although the ISP maintains the Sex Offender Registry (SOR) which provides information via the internet on sex offenders, Public Act 94-0994 mandated collection of additional information and inclusion of a mapping function. The enhancement provides a mechanism which allows the requestor to provide an address and obtain the name and address of a sex offender residing within 500 feet to five miles of the entered address. 2007 National High School Rodeo

In July 2007, the Illinois Department of Agriculture hosted the National High School Rodeo Association Finals at the Illinois State Fairgrounds. Hundreds of teen-aged competitors from 40 states, Canada, and Australia competed in a variety of rodeo events, all vying for scholarship money and the distinction of being recognized as a national champion. The ISP was tasked with providing 24-hour security and traffic control assistance for the event. Nineteen officers from District 9 and four officers from other ISP work units staffed the event. The detail worked closely with the Department of Agriculture and National High School Rodeo Association officials to ensure the safety of the participants, families, and the thousands of daily spectators. A particular concern was issues and problems associated with animal activist groups that monitor and attend these types of events. The event proved to be extremely successful with the majority of credit going to the officers that worked the detail.

Grand National American Trapshooting Championships

For the past two years, the Grand National American Trapshooting Championships have been held at the new World Shooting Complex near Sparta from early to mid August, and typically draws approximately 200,000 participants, spectators, and vendors into the area for approximately 12 to 14 days. Some of the best trap shooters in the world compete in this event, and occasionally a well-known celebrity will make an appearance as well. Vendors are on hand with competition shotguns for sale that often run into the hundreds of thousands of dollars. District 13 commits several officers to the detail to provide traffic control, security, and safety for the participants, vendors, and spectators attending the event.



Annual Awards

The ISP's Annual Awards Ceremony was held on April 7 in Springfield. Director Trent presented the Officer of the Year Award to Special Agent John Kaylor of Zone 4 Investigations; Telecommunicator of the Year Award to Mr. Kenneth Williams of District 10, Pesotum; and Forensic Scientist of the Year Award to Mr. John Onstwedder of the Forensic Science Center at Chicago.

Officer of the Year

As a member of Zone 4 Investigations' Child/Sex Unit, Officer of the Year recipient Special Agent John Kaylor's dogged persistence has put numerous sexual predators in prison for life. Agent Kaylor is considered the "go to" person in Zone 4 for crimes against children, and as a former Juvenile Probation Officer, he has unique insights into the criminal justice system, criminal psyche, and criminal culture. Building upon a solid patrol background, Agent Kaylor has evolved into one of the Department's premier criminal investigators.

Forensic Scientist of the Year

As a Latent Prints Examiner at the Forensic Science Center at Chicago, Forensic Scientist of the Year John Onstwedder was

The case ended with the successful prosecution of the defendant(s). Mr. Onstwedder also serves as the Statewide Automated Fingerprint Identification System (AFIS) Coordinator.

Telecommunicator of the Year

Telecommunicator of the Year Mr. Kenneth Williams, a four-year veteran of the Department, has used his computer knowledge to assist District 10 with the Illinois Wireless Information Network, Computer Aided Dispatch, and STARCOM21 communications applications for the district. He has also handled several critical 9-1-1 calls, including a domestic situation involving a knife, and a subject who witnessed his friend's suicide. Telecommunicator Williams also displayed a professional demeanor while copying traffic between a Trooper who asked for help from another officer and didn't get a response. After sensing a problem with the traffic stop, he sent assistance to the officer's location.

Medal for Honor

The Medal for Honor is awarded to Illinois State Police personnel who perform a heroic act that, by its nature, results in saving a life, preventing a serious crime, or apprehending a person who committed a serious crime. The eligible act, while of a lesser degree than that required for the Medal for Valor, must nevertheless have been accomplished with distinction.

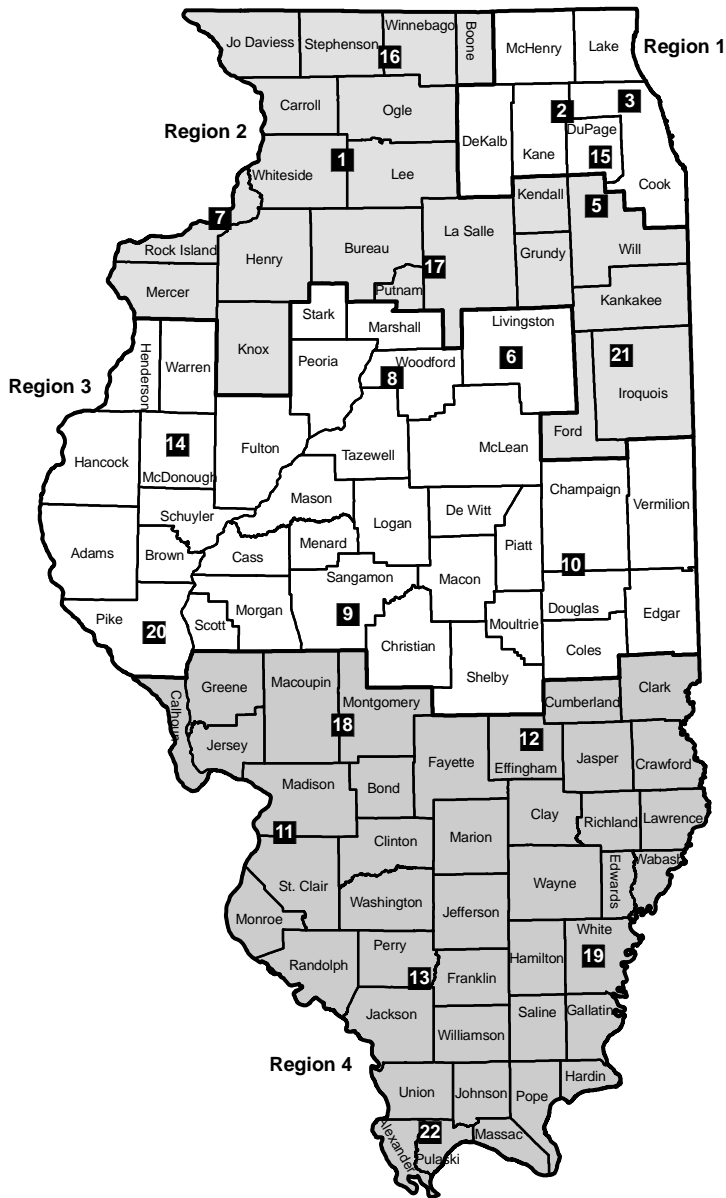
Law Enforcement Medal of Honor
