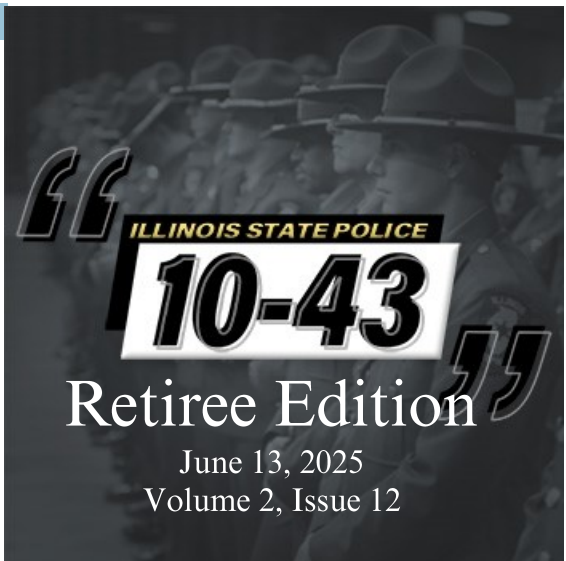

ISP Receives New Command Vehicle

SPRINGFIELD – The Illinois State Police (ISP) is proud to announce the deployment of a new state-of-the-art command vehicle designed to improve emergency response coordination, enhance public safety, and provide crucial on-site support during critical incidents across the state. The command vehicle was provided by the U.S. Department of Energy, Office of Radiological Security.

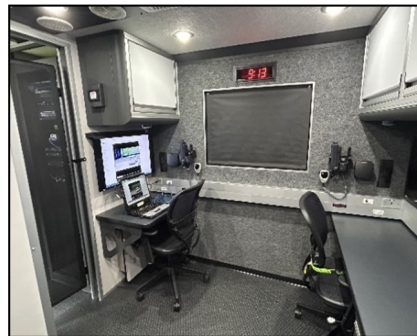
The new command vehicle, a 2025 Freightliner, replaces an 18-year-old vehicle with antiquated technology. The new command vehicle is equipped with high-definition cameras and monitors, state-of-the-art communications technology, real-time data access, and dual slide outs for a large conference room. It will serve as a central hub for ISP officers during emergencies such as natural disasters, large-scale accidents, public events, and search-and-rescue operations.

"This command vehicle gives us the ability to respond faster, coordinate more effec-



tively, and better serve our communities during critical incidents," said ISP Director Brendan F. Kelly. "It's a mobile operations center that puts technology and leadership exactly where it's needed most—right on the ground at the scene of the incident."

Beyond emergency situations, and to further strengthen the connection between ISP and the people we serve, the new command vehicle will be used for community outreach programs, safety demonstrations, and public events. Additionally, the vehicle will also be used for training ISP officers on response to hazardous materials incidents.

You Can't BEE Serious

Expect the unexpected.

On June 9, 2025, Troop 4 officers were dispatched to a traffic crash involving two truck-tractor semi-trailers (TTSTs). Upon arrival, first responders were met with an unexpected and highly unusual complication - one of the TTSTs had been transporting a load of live bees. The impact of the crash compromised the cargo, releasing millions of agitated bees into the area and overtaking the crash site.

In coordination with the Marshall County Sheriff's Office and other responding agencies, officers learned of a local beekeeper who lived nearby. Miraculously, the beekeeper also possessed a valid Class A CDL. The beekeeper was contacted and responded promptly to the scene. Despite the dangerous conditions, he was able to enter the vehicle and safely drive it from the crash site to a secure location off the interstate, allowing traffic to resume in record time.

The "bee truck" was parked in an empty lot, where the company later arrived and successfully transferred the bees to another truck for relocation.

Clyde Marquis, age 84 of Greenville, passed away Thursday, May 22, 2025, at St. Louis University Hospital in St. Louis, Missouri after a brief illness.

Clyde Henry Marquis was born November 29, 1940, in Alton, Illinois. He was the son of the late Clyde J. Marquis and Kay (Ebler) Marquis. He attended Alton schools and

graduated from Alton High School with the class of 1959.

Clyde served our country in the United States Army. He was enlisted on October 4, 1963, and honorably discharged on October 2, 1965.

Mr. Marquis worked for the **Illinois State Police** and attended and graduated from the State Police Academy. He was a trooper for District 11 from 1968 – 1997. He retired with 30 years in law enforcement.

Clyde is survived by his wife, Mary of 36 years, married July 9, 1988. Survived by son Brian (Amy) Wernle of Greenville and daughter Deann Wernle of Chesterfield, Missouri. IN MEMORY OF OUR FALLEN TROOPER

Trooper
Chong Soo Lim

End of Watch
June 6, 1995

Trooper Chong Soo Lim was killed when his patrol car was struck from behind while on a traffic stop on the North-west Tollway. His squad car was rear-ended and burst into flames. He was sitting in his squad car when a pickup truck struck the rear of his vehicle and forced it into the automobile in front of him. The force of the collision caused the gas tank to explode and trapped Trooper Lim inside. The driver of the pickup truck was arrested for DUI and later charged with manslaughter for Trooper Lim's death and sentenced to eight years in prison.

Born in South Korea, Trooper Lim patrolled District 3 in Chicago (later District Chicago, now Troop 3) upon his graduation from the Academy. He transferred to the midnight shift in District 15, Oak Brook, just one month before his death. He is survived by his wife.
