

The visit fostered positive connections between law enforcement and the community's youngest members, helping to build trust at an early age. ISP DCI Hosted 2025 Leadership Summit in Decatur

Decatur, IL - The Illinois State Police (ISP) Division of Criminal Investigation (DCI) successfully concluded its annual Leadership Summit 2025, held November 4–6 in Decatur, Illinois. The three-day professional development event brought together law enforcement leaders, investigators, and subject matter experts to discuss critical investigative strategies, emerging technologies, and high-profile case studies.

Under the theme of advancing investigative excellence, the summit featured presentations



from guest speakers, including Colonel Robert Hodges of the Louisiana State Police, who addressed lessons learned from the Bourbon Street attack, and Retired Captain Dave Atkins of the New York State Police, who shared insights on crisis response in his session “One Decision Away.”

Key sessions across the three days included:

- Day 1 (November 4): Focused on leadership and specialized operations, with briefings on the Officer in Charge/Crisis

Negotiation Team (OIC/CNT) by Captain Bret Burris and Intelligence Support Unit (ISU) capabilities by Master Sergeant Randall Copsey and Special Agent Rico Mancha.

- Day 2 (November 5): Explored emerging investigative tools, human trafficking enforcement, and real-world case reviews. The day concluded with intelligence briefings on nihilistic violent extremism presented by FBI Special Agent Jacob Griffin.
- Day 3 (November 6): Highlighted cutting-edge technology platforms such as FUSUS, CrimePad, and ALPR (Automated License Plate Recognition) systems. Attendees also received in-depth case reviews on complex investigations, including homicides, sexual assaults, and a U.S. Marshals Service officer-involved shooting.

“This summit underscores DCI’s commitment to continuous improvement, interagency collaboration, and adopting innovative tools to combat crime,” said Colonel J.W. Price, Deputy Director of DCI. “The expertise shared over these three days strengthens our ability to protect Illinois communities.”

The event fostered collaboration among ISP zones, command staff, and federal partners, reinforcing intelligence-driven policing and investigative best practices.

ISP Squad Car Struck in Peoria County by Hit and Run Driver

ISP Experiences 13th Move Over Law-Related Crash of 2025

BARTONVILLE – An Illinois State Police (ISP) squad car was damaged on US-24 at Mendenhall Road in Peoria County when it was sideswiped by another vehicle during a traffic stop.

On November 3, 2025, at approximately 7:24 p.m., an ISP Trooper was pulled over on the right shoulder of US-24 near Mendenhall Road with their emergency lights activated for a traffic stop. A black Ford Escape failed to move over and struck the driver's side mirror of the Trooper's squad car, resulting in minor damage. The Trooper was outside of the squad car at the time of the crash and reported no injuries. The Ford Escape fled the scene. The investigation is ongoing.

In 2025, ISP has now suffered 13 Move Over Law-related crashes. In 2024, ISP suffered 27 Move Over Law-related crashes with 12 Troopers injured and one death. In 2023, ISP had 21 Move Over Law-related crashes with seven Troopers injured. ISP reminds the public the Move Over Law, also known as "Scott's Law" in Illinois, requires all drivers to move over when approaching an emergency vehicle or any vehicle with its emergency or hazard lights activated.

A person who violates the Move Over Law faces a fine of no less than \$250 and no more than \$10,000 for a first offense. If the violation results in injury to another person, the violator's driver's license will be suspended for a mandatory period of anywhere between six months and two years. ISP Arrests Chicago Man for Road Rage Expressway Shooting Less than 24-Hours After Receiving the Report

CHICAGO – Illinois State Police (ISP) Division of Criminal Investigation Zone 1 Special Agents arrested 29-year-old Bowen Zhang of Chicago, IL for one count of Attempted Murder (Class X) and one count of Aggravated Discharge of a Firearm (Class 1 Felony) related to a road rage expressway shooting on the Stevenson Expressway.

On November 5, 2025, ISP Troopers received a delayed report of an expressway shooting that occurred on I-55 northbound north of California Avenue. A road rage incident occurred, and the driver of the suspect vehicle fired a weapon at the victim's vehicle, striking it multiple times. The victim was uninjured and reported the incident later in the day.

ISP Special Agents conducted a thorough investigation and identified the suspect vehicle and suspected shooter, Zhang, within 24-hours. On November 6, 2025, Special Agents located Zhang and took him into custody without incident.

ISP Special Agents presented their case to the Cook County State's Attorney's Office and the above-mentioned charges were filed. Zhang was held pending his first court hearing. There is no further information available at this time.

The Special Operations Group (SOG) Statewide Anti-Violence Enforcement (SAVE) South Team congratulates K9 Max on his retirement effective October 31, 2025.

K9 Max is recognized for seven years of dedicated service with the Illinois State Police, Troop 8, and South SAVE.

A loyal partner to Special Agent Don Cary and Trooper Ethan Hanrahan, K9 Max served as a full-service canine skilled in narcotics detection, tracking, and criminal apprehension, and was a member



of a U.S. Marshals Fugitive Task Force. His career



includes assisting in 182 U.S. Marshal warrants, 14 bite and 53 no-bite apprehensions, 93 firearm recoveries, the seizure of over \$545,000 of U.S. currency, and 2,000 pounds of illegal narcotics.

Today, we honor and celebrate the outstanding service of Canine Max, who has not only been a loyal partner to his handlers Special Agent Don Cary and Trooper Ethan Hanrahan, but has also served the Illinois State Police, Troop 8, South SAVE, and his community with unparalleled courage and dedication.

For 7 years, Max has been on the front lines, tirelessly working alongside our Troopers to keep the streets safe. During their time on patrol, Canine Max and his handlers exemplified exceptional dedication to duty and together had formed extraordinary partnerships. Canine Max completed the 10-week basic canine training course and began his career in the spring of 2018 in Troop 8. He quickly became an integral part of the south SAVE Team. Canine Max retired as a full-service canine, proficient in narcotic odor detection, tracking, article searches, and criminal apprehension.

For many years, Max participated in an inter-agency fugitive task force with the United

State Marshalls Service. He enhanced community safety and security using complex criminal investigations to locate and apprehend federal and egregiously violent state and local fugitives from the Metro East.

Their loyalty, skill, and commitment are things we can all look up to. Canine Max's career highlights include assisting in serving 182 United States Marshalls Service warrants, 14 bite apprehensions, 53 no bite apprehensions, 77 tracks for fleeing offenders, 93 illegal firearms recovered, assisting in the seizure of approximately 545 thousand dollars in illicit U.S. Currency, and over 2,000 pounds in illegal narcotics including fentanyl, methamphetamine, cocaine, crack cocaine, heroin, and marijuana.

As we retire Max from active service, we reflect on the sacrifices made, the challenges faced, and the victories achieved. Max can enjoy a well-deserved rest and the comfort of life knowing that he's truly made a difference.

Illinois Goes from "F" to "A" on Support for Survivors of Human Trafficking

Illinois Ranks Second In The Nation For Human Trafficking Survivor Laws

SPRINGFIELD – The Illinois State Police (ISP) is announcing Illinois has gone from an “F” on the Shared Hope International [Just Like Me Report Cards](#) to an “A” due to the recent passage of the [Illinois Statewide Trauma-Informed Response to Human Trafficking Act](#). Illinois is one of only three states to receive an “A” grade. The Just Like Me Report Cards grade states based on a Top Ten list of laws focused on human trafficking survivors and addressing its lasting impacts. Illinois is now ranked second in the nation for its policies surrounding human trafficking survivors.

“Illinois is now among the leading states in the fight against human trafficking, and this new ‘A’ ranking from Shared Hope International represents my administration’s enduring commitment to keeping all Illinoisans safe,” said Governor JB Pritzker. “This year, I proudly signed pivotal legislation that established a coordinated, multi-agency effort to better support survivors of human trafficking. Using trauma-informed strategies to identify and support survivors across Illinois, these imperative measures are helping us protect and empower our most vulnerable.”

Earlier this year, the Illinois General Assembly passed and Governor Pritzker signed [Senate Bill 2323](#), the Illinois Statewide Trauma-Informed Response to Human Traffic Act (Act), to provide consistency in the state’s response by creating a uniform service response, policies, agency infrastructure, screening tools, training, and protocols. Much of the act focused on survivors.

“Supporting people who have been trafficked, a modern day form of slavery, is a moral imperative that requires a comprehensive framework involving coordination between public and private partners,” said ISP Director and Joint Human Trafficking Work Group Chair Brendan F. Kelly. “By supporting survivors, law enforcement can be more effective in going after traffickers using the infor-

mation and knowledge survivors are now more comfortable sharing with law enforcement, knowing that resources are available to build a new life.”

The groundwork for the Act was laid by the ISP and Illinois Department of Human Services led Joint Human Trafficking Working Group – an ad hoc working group comprised of several State agencies, the Office of the Illinois Attorney General, the Illinois Law Enforcement Training and Standards Board, the Office of the State’s Attorneys Appellate Prosecutor, and more than 60 stakeholders representing human trafficking, domestic violence, and sexual assault advocacy organizations, survivors, local law enforcement, prosecutors, and courts, as well as medical, substance use disorder, and behavioral health providers.

“This progress reflects the power of community – survivors, advocates, and public servants coming together to build systems rooted in dignity and care,” said Secretary of the Illinois Department of Human Services and Joint Human Trafficking Working Group Co-Chair, Dulce M. Quintero. “At IDHS, we know healing doesn’t happen in isolation – it grows from connection, from being seen, and from having access to support that honors each person’s experience. This Act strengthens our shared capacity to respond with humanity and purpose.”

The first step to supporting survivors is identifying them. The Act calls for expanded screening of those in the State’s care (Department of Children and Family Services, juvenile justice, corrections) to identify individuals who are being trafficked. The Act also mandates training for state inspectors, investigators, and regulators on signs of human trafficking in industries at high risk for trafficking, such as restaurants, hotel, agriculture, construction, and educational materials on

the rights of youth workers. To help law enforcement identify those being trafficked, the Act requires the development of law enforcement curriculum standards and policy guidelines for human trafficking detection, investigation, and response.

Once identified, providing support services to help survivors of human trafficking through a trauma-informed process is essential to promoting recovery, empowerment, and reintegration into society. Collaboration among law enforcement, social workers, the legal system, state agencies, healthcare providers, and community organizations strengthens the network of protection and resources available to victims. The Act includes specific provisions to support those who have been trafficked.

- Coordinates several state agencies through a single statewide plan to identify and respond to survivors.

- Creates standards of care for human trafficking service providers.
-
- Develops curriculum standards and training for human trafficking and other service providers.
-
- Calls for collaboration with medical and legal associations to provide training for their members working with survivors.

- Requires Children’s Advocacy Centers adopt multidisciplinary team human trafficking task force protocols and facilitate training, standards, and collaboration to ensure a coordinated response to trafficked children.

In alignment with the Act, ISP, partnering with local law enforcement and private partners, recently created the Illinois Trafficking Enforcement Group (ITEG) to take its work in combating human trafficking to the next level. Similar to the nine ISP Metropolitan Enforcement Groups and 13 Multi-Jurisdictional Drug Task Forces created to combat drug trafficking, ITEG consists of local and state partners focused on fighting human trafficking, while also working with community groups and health organizations to provide trauma-informed support services to individuals who have been trafficked.

Every year, millions of men, women, and children are victims of trafficking worldwide, including in the United States and in Illinois. The signs of human trafficking can be subtle. In Memoriam: K-9 Roman

With great love and sadness, we announce the passing of K9 Roman, the intrepid partner of Master Sergeant Sean Veryzer. Roman passed on November 6, 2025, surrounded by the Veryzer family and his ISP sisters and brothers after battling terminal illness. Roman retired in October of 2024 after an exceptional career.

Master Sergeant Sean Veryzer and Roman have exemplified dedication to duty and together have formed an extraordinary partnership. Roman began his career in the Spring of 2013 as a full-service canine - proficient in narcotic odor detection, tracking, article searches, and criminal apprehension. Initially assigned to what is now Troop 2, Roman quickly became an integral component of the northern Highway Interdiction Team through his tenacity and tradecraft, enhanced by the skilled handling of Master Sergeant Veryzer.

Throughout his career, Master Sergeant Veryzer and Roman worked collaboratively with numerous state, county, local, and federal agencies. Together, they worked to exploit the vulnerabilities in drug networks and trafficking organizations through coordinated interdiction efforts on strategic roadways throughout Illinois. The strength of this partnership established a crippling effect on indi-



viduals and criminal organizations trafficking illicit narcotics and currency through our state. **Throughout their partnership, Roman was instrumental to the seizure of 11,820 pounds of cannabis, 314 kilos of cocaine, 157 kilos of heroin, 267 pounds of methamphetamine,**



13 criminal apprehensions and the seizure of over \$5,000,000 in illicit USC. Moreover, Master Sergeant Veryzer and Roman consistently engaged with the community through demonstrations at schools and civic events, showcasing the capabilities of a well-trained K9 team. Their efforts extended to drug searches, school searches, and building searches, impacting multiple facets of public safety, and showcasing the diversity and professionalism of ISP. K9 Roman made his final contraband seizure just days prior to retiring - recovering 20 kilos of cocaine during a traffic stop on September 23, 2024.



Roman was a loyal partner and loving family member to Master Sergeant Veryzer and the Veryzer family and a dedicated asset to the ISP. Although he will be missed, the dedication and hard work of Master Sergeant Veryzer and Roman are memorialized through the Illinois State Police Canine Section and the established high standard for K9 partnerships everywhere.


